

# Riverside's Outdoor Classroom continues to see progress

Riverside's Outdoor Classroom has undergone a lot of transformations since the start of the school year. What was once a dilapidated area on the corner of Harrison and Porter has slowly been transformed into an inspiring area where students can be stimulated and where neighborhood children can let their imaginations soar!

As many of you noticed, we have our first student-art installation, located on the tall vertical pillars in the center of the Outdoor Classroom. Led by our wonderful art teacher and Riverside neighbor, Mrs. Abby Penna, she worked with fourth- and fifth-grade students over the last two years creating masterpieces that were then adhered to the posts.

We also have a stone lion statue, in honor of our Riverside friend, Don Henrichs. We will also be selling personalized engraved stones that can be placed permanently in the terrace we will be creating. Since our Riverside community is an integral part of the school's support system, we will be extending the offer to purchase a personalized stone to our neighbors. The area boasts picnic tables for a class celebration or project, a tabletop teacher's surface, an herb sensory garden, a high-tech wireless weather station, interlocking smaller benches, outdoor sink, storage shed, "R" shaped brick pathways, compost bin, a metal trash can and a stone "Riverside" sign in the floral area.

The Outdoor Classroom also gained a stage, a great place for presentations and performances for students and neighborhood children alike to enjoy! The stage was paid for entirely by funds from Riverside's Lion's Den (a school store whereby anyone can purchase items for a quarter) and built by our wonderfully supportive Riverside Bazzelle family. Benches will soon be installed in front of the stage, so be sure to look for this new addition.

We have had thefts over the summer in the Outdoor Classroom (decorative signs, as well as plants and trees being specifically dug up and removed), so we ask our wonderful Riverside community to be aware of the area and help keep watch for any frowned-upon activities. We thank our community for their support; we couldn't have accomplished this much without you!

Last night a fight near the corner of First and Main attracted quite a crowd. The men were both arrested, and when taken to the station gave the names of F. C. Skelly and L. C. Foon. It appears that the latter had been driven over the street by the former in his hack, and had then tried to slip away without paying the bill. The demand for the money brought on the fight, which resulted very much in the driver's favor, as he succeeded in most beautifully frescoing the countenance of his delinquent customer. •
